Is the language used by politicians alienating to its audience?



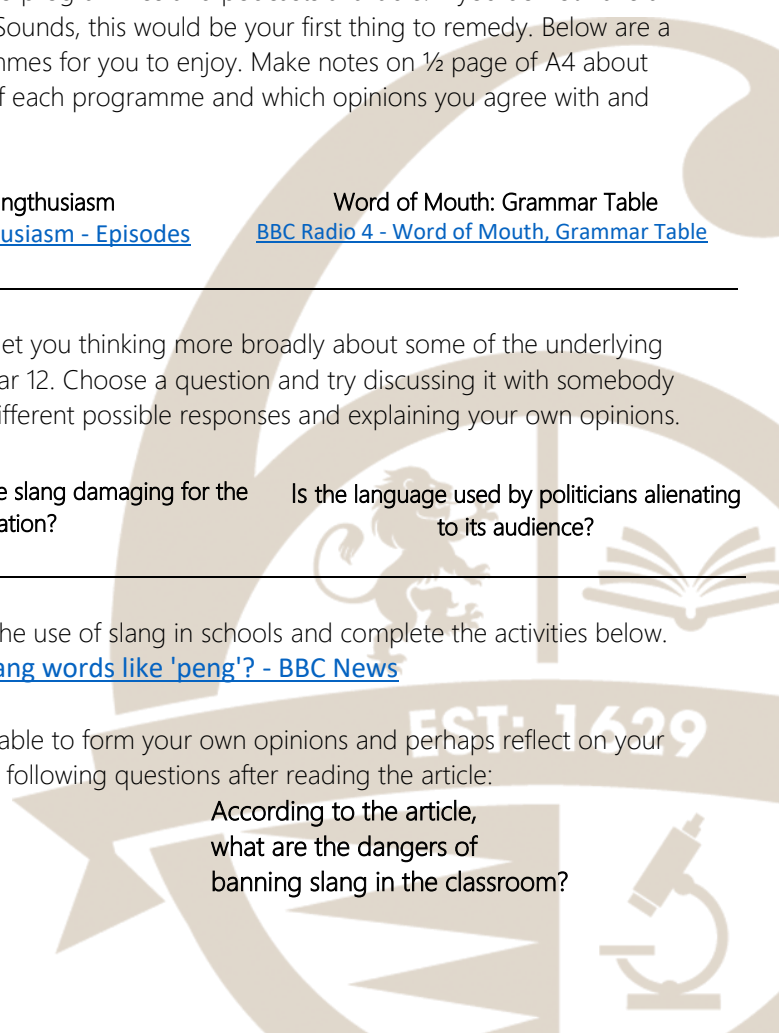
Debate
